FY 24-25 Last Year Budget Review



- ❑ Balanced Budget
- ❑ Real Estate Property Tax Rate reduced from .61 to .43
- ❑ Effective RE Property Tax Increase of 2 cents
- ❑ Tax Relief for Elderly
- ❑ Current FY 24-25 Budget is approximately \$178,793,573 (minimal -2.73 % decrease)
- ❑ Inflationary Budget
 - ❑ Expenses were balanced with good fortune of interest earnings of approximately \$2 million.
 - ❑ Capital Budget was balanced with \$2.5 million from year-end surplus
 - ❑ Interest earnings are projected to decrease over time and therefore will need to be replenished with any new, ongoing revenue .



FY24-25 Budget Recap

- ❑ \$1.4 million new, recurring funding to Schools
 - ❑ \$500K one time additional money for school bus replacement
 - ❑ \$1.3 million in County Capital additional recurring funding
 - ❑ \$2 million in one time money to restore capital funding and balance CIP
 - ❑ COLA 3% \$825K
 - ❑ Health Insurance premium increase \$412K

- Eliminate 2 SRO positions from school closings; Reduce phase-in funding
- Some operational line-item modifications (i.e. Board contingency, fuel reserve, part-time minimum wage reduction)
- Capital reductions (i.e. Fire apparatus, buses, vehicle / equipment replacement, facility maintenance, etc.)
- Capital reductions recommended to be offset / funded through fund balance and then replenished through any FY 24 carry over



FY 25-26 Local Budget Climate

- ❑ Revenue growth appears to be moderating and returning to more historical norms
- ❑ Inflationary pressures continue to persist
- ❑ Governor's proposed State funding to Schools is minimal at \$160K, however General Assembly budget amendments are more favorable of approximately \$2 million of potential, additional funding to schools. State Budget likely not finalized until late April / May.
- ❑ Minimal State funding to localities

New Discretionary Revenue of only \$588K is projected at this time, when taking out pass thru federal, state, and restricted dollars (i.e. Grants, EMS Billing, etc.)

FY 25-26 Budget Pressures

Operational Environment – Additional \$5.2 million in Operating Requests Additional \$768k in Position Requests

- ❑ Inflation – fuel, utilities, vehicles, equipment, maintenance contracts, capital
- ❑ CSA – complex high-dollar cases
- ❑ Decline in School Enrollment – State Funding Reduction (LCI) for FY27
- ❑ Increased Juvenile Detention Population (Per Diem Operations - Debt Service)
- ❑ Phase-in SROs Budgetary costs - \$80K in FY 2026, \$325K in FY 2027 and FY 2028
 - ❑ Additional loss in grant funding for FY 27 due to LCI reset – unknown impact

Personnel

- ❑ Competitive Labor Market with other localities / private sector (28 vacancies)
 - ❑ Public Safety position vacancies affecting station / EMS coverage (10 vacancies)
 - ❑ Sheriff position vacancies (3 vacancies) and E-911 Dispatch (4 vacancies)
- ❑ COLA (State is proposing a 3% increase where for each 1% requires \$287K)
- ❑ Minimum Wage Increase effective January 1, 2026
- ❑ Market compensation adjustments
- ❑ Health Insurance Renewal increase 15% after RFP



FY 25-26 Health Renewal

Health Insurance Renewal

- ❑ Several high dollar claims
- ❑ RFP responses received February 11th
- ❑ Overall increase 15% in renewal rates; using prior year enrollment would require approximately \$825,000 to cover employee and employer share
- ❑ Cost shift to employees is inevitable for FY 2026 Plan Design
- ❑ Proposed Plan Design and approval of rates planned for BOS March 18th meeting



Capital Improvements & Maintenance Significant Pressures



5-Year Capital Improvement Plan

FY 2026

- ❑ Annual Recurring Local Funding \$3.7 million
- ❑ \$16 million in total FY 2025-26 Department CIP requests
- ❑ \$11.3 million requests currently unfunded with recurring revenue

FY 2026-2030

- ❑ 5-Year CIP total requests \$80 million
 - ❑ \$51 million unfunded without new recurring revenue
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Public Safety 5 Year CIP Highlights

- Fire/EMS Apparatus Replacement \$12.8 million
- Radio Communications- end of life radio models and solving critical infrastructure support of approximately \$2.5 million
- Fire/EMS Response Vehicles \$1.2 million



General Properties 5 Year CIP Look

- HVAC Replacements \$1 million
- Roof Replacements \$2.3 million
- Courthouse & Jail Maintenance \$2.3 million
- New E911 Facility \$4 million
- New Public Safety Administration Facility \$3.4 million
- New Social Services Facility or Renovation \$6 million



Solid Waste 5 Year CIP Look

- Engineering/Compliance & Equipment Lease \$1.2 million
- Rebuild/Replace Equipment \$2 million
- Cell 4 Construction and Closure of cell 2 (in years 6-10) \$7 million plus
- New Collection Sites @ Sago/Penhook/Snow Creek/Callaway and Landfill Scale House \$1.8 million



Parks and Recreation 5 Year CIP Look

- Capital Maintenance for Repairs/Renovations and Playground Replacement/Construction \$1.6 million
- Vehicle & Equipment Replacement \$670,000
- Athletic Field Lighting and Improvements \$3.4 million
- Parks Expansion/Improvements \$440,000



Capital Structural Imbalance

Capital Environment

- ❑ **Capital Infrastructure Needs** (i.e. County & School Buildings HVAC / Roofs, Landfill, Broadband, Fire Apparatus, Ambulances)
- ❑ **Significant Capital Inflation**
 - Ambulance
 - Fire Apparatus Replacement
 - E911 New / Renovated Facility
 - Public Safety Administration New / Renovated Facility
 - Social Services New or Upgraded Facility
 - General Fleet Vehicles
 - School Bus Replacements
- ❑ As shared previously, the County and School's Capital Budget Funding / Transfer has remained relatively flat for well over a decade and is not sustainable going forward. While the addition of \$1.3 million in new funding for Capital made a small dent this year, significant additional funding is required to address the CIP's structural imbalance.



Recurring Annual Capital Structural Imbalance

- ❑ Increased revenue for major equipment replacement (i.e. apparatus, landfill, etc.) needs to be identified and implemented to address this structural imbalance. Not doing so pressures an unsteady climate in the balancing of the County's annual budget (i.e. budget stabilization reserves, etc.).
- ❑ Current FY 24-25 County Capital Budget Balanced with one-time \$2.5 Million from Carry-Over / Year End Service. Future Carry-Over dollars are not guaranteed and are projected to diminish based on current projections.

FY 25-26 Proposed Budget

- ❑ FY 2026 Proposed Budget scheduled to be presented to BOS March 11th
- ❑ Funding current operational service levels for County and Schools not possible at current tax rates
- ❑ CIP will require additional ongoing revenue to fund capital needs
- ❑ No estimates are available for property taxes from MVP
- ❑ Possible consideration of real estate, personal property, meals tax increases and/or cigarette tax implementation
